### **Celebrating 25 Years**

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The answer was clearly the building of relationships that foster healing and inclusion. This is reflected in the new business name we adopted, **Restoring Connections.** 

Listening even more deeply to our donors, volunteers, partners, and clients in 2021, we learned that our most valuable contribution is Soul Care. Concerned with the whole person, Soul Care goes by many different names, including spiritual direction, spiritual companioning, and soul care mentoring. It responds to the need for life purpose and meaning. It attends to healing and calling; interior life and relationships; family and community; sabbath and work; service and social justice. It enables an individual to explore a core foundation in their relationship with the divine.

This fall, our commitment to Soul Care included

- **direct services** to individuals
- formation and training in Soul Care
- attentiveness to systemic issues needing healing.



Soul Care for Justice-Involved Women

Direct services embraced Soul Care Mentoring for Justice-Involved Women during incarceration and reentry. Denver Women's Correctional Facility has re-opened to volunteers and we are active within the facility once again. More about this next month.



#### Memorial Service

**Direct services** also involved our now-annual Memorial Service at the beginning of November, including a self-care "Healing through Grief" workshop for those who have lost loved ones. Following the memorial, 135 trees are scheduled for planting in memory of departed loved ones.

# Tying all of these programs together is Soul Care and the need for healing.



Formation Program for Soul Care

This fall we have provided **formation and training** for individuals interested in providing Soul Care for others. We started a new cohort in our Formation Program for Soul Care in June. Interns in this 15-month program are responding to the needs of children, adolescents in need, young adults identifying their gifts and seeking to serve on the margins, individuals in the correctional system, and migrants fleeing violence.



## Grandparenting as a Healing Presence

As additional **formation and training**, grandparents were offered a workshop on being a healing presence and how they can care for the soul of their families and serve as soul care mentors for grandchildren.





#### Racial Healing

Finally, our attentiveness to systemic issues included 8-week inquiry groups on Racial Healing. Participants studied, prayed together, shared in small groups, and engaged in various immersion experiences. They included the opportunity to hear from Central American mothers desperately seeking their children in this country, relational opportunities with black faith communities, a Five Points Walk in Denver, and an evening with Dr. Carlotta Walls LaNier, the youngest of the Little Rock Nine.
